

CLASSIFICATION: Bill Foussard gave a quick summary of his situation for the Classification talk .He said this is the weirdest set of circumstances he has been involved with since being in the hotel business since 1975. WB Country Inn is averaging 10 rooms occupied per night. Rudy's is available for take out with a free roll of toilet paper with each order. He is offering gift cards with a \$10 bonus for each \$100 card. He thanked everyone for their generosity and patronage.

PROGRAM: Mike Lovett Presents: Claudia Aurand, Director of Language Services, German-American Institute, "Learning from Germany's Model of Opportunity"

The German-American Institute is in St. Paul. Its mission is connecting people to a broader world through German language and culture. Germany is the 4th largest economy in the world with a population of 89 million. They have a skilled workforce, low unemployment, and no student debt. Claudia presented a case for looking at the German dual model of education noting some of the shortcomings of the current US model. We have a model that pushes two or four year post secondary education for all, after graduation from high school. Problems with this model include: only 81% graduate from high school, only 70% of those enroll in post-secondary ed., 30% of those who enroll drop out. Average student debt in MN at end of their schooling is \$32,000. We need to educate people for the skill drain as boomers retire to fill the projected 240,000 job openings and with only 30% of all youth graduating from post-secondary education, we'll come up short of skilled workers. In the German dual education model, everyone has the same path from K to 4th grade. After that, students have choices to graduate in grade 9, grade 10, or grade "13". Many German professions have apprenticeships where students are paid and have their education paid as a subsidy by the employer to the state. They support about 350 professions and are not the typical vocational track we have in the US. Professions include banking and finance, travel and tourism, even becoming a beer brewer and many more. Private industry and Chamber of Commerce are connected in assessing and monitoring student certifications so that students have skills that apply directly to employment needs. In Germany, 50% of the population gets a two-year associate degree and 30% get a four-year university degree. According to Claudia, the apprenticeship and dual education model provides a highly skilled workforce that has less job turnover, increased productivity, and enhanced efficiency in the long run. We currently have a limited experience with this innovative German-like dual model in our state.
