CLASSIFICATION TIME: ANN FRISCH

Ann Stirling (her great-grandmother's name) Mullen (her father's name) Frisch shared with us her extensive work in the area of world peace, beginning in her early twenties when she spent two years in Guatemala. She returned in 2007 as a civilian protector during a time both the military and families that had members killed were holding commemorations. She later travelled to South Sudan as a civilian protector and led training sessions for Sudanese women there. In 2017, she was honored as a Rotary International Peace Champion. At the Atlanta Rotary International Conference as part of the Rotary Action Group for Peace she became involved in the movement to abolish nuclear weapons and in February of this year lectured on reducing violence and protecting civilians in armed conflict. She is chair of Rotary International's Nuclear Weapons Education Subcommittee. Ann has a daughter with whom she is very close and shares with her partner David a number of grandchildren, including Cooper, the latest addition to her family. She also supports a young Guatemalan woman and her educational efforts.

Program: Nora Slawik introduced Alene Tchourumoff, senior vice president, Community Development and Engagement, Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis since 2018. Alene previously served as chair of the Metropolitan Council. Alene explained the Federal Reserve Bank's roles: monetary policy, banking supervision, financial services, and community development and engagement. Her team works to advance the economic well-being and prosperity of low- to moderate-income individuals, households, communities and Indian Country across the Ninth Federal Reserve District, using research, data analysis, and policy development as well as convening to enhance understanding of emerging issues. Significant work, for example, has been done in the area of early childhood, recognizing that children are the future of our workforce. In October 2020, the Fed initiated an 11-part series on Racism and The Economy to highlight the implications of structural racism in the United States and identify solutions. The series has focused on the disparities that limit opportunities and that constrain long-term vitality for all, being-forward-looking and seeking ways to disrupt current systems, practices, and policies. Some highlights of the first session on employment: changing demographics among age groups will keep us young, important for the workforce. Disparities in unemployment rates and wage gaps between whites and people of color, as well as for women, are significant. Occupational segregation, or 'pedigree/degree-based" hiring, must change and employers can lead the way in shifting practices. Earnings gaps are not explained by education alone and the second in the series focused on education, recognizing that to succeed in the workforce and contribute to the economic health of the nation, many current practices need to be disrupted. The educational achievement gaps in Minnesota are some of the biggest in the country. The third program focused on housing where again there are significant gaps and disparities in Minnesota: 76.9% of homeowners are white: 25% are Black. Some proposals that have surfaced: eliminate single family zoning to increase supply (CA, Minneapolis): create a restorative justice model such as a fund to buy homes (Evanston); and changing the appraisal process and how Black and Brown neighborhoods are valued. Future programs are on racism in the economics profession: entrepreneurship & small businesses; access to credit; criminal justice; health; wealth. Alene suggested Rotary might host "watch sessions" and lead community conversations and discussion on the issues raised.
