Gretchen Harriman, Principal, White Bear Lake Area Alternative Learning Center

The center has benefited from the connection to Rotary and STRIVE. Her father was part of a group study exchange to Sweden in the 1970s, living in Kenosha at the time. She learned early on about service — the mindset led her to the ALC.

ALC started as an evening high school program that later moved to north campus, and began in 1996. Finally found their own site — Mark Sather helped the ALC find one. It also has a school called Insight — a recovery school within a school. That has gone on for 20 years. There are two in the metro.

It now uses the former Gulf View Elementary — it was able to get the second floor. It is close to south campus and the YMCA, both beneficial for students. She said the school fights stigma misperceptions about the school. It is not where the bad kids go. What it is: calm, a learning community, a small setting where kids can be known. Students get same diploma; it isn't a GED program. ALC isn't a place that students are sent; it is a choice for them to attend there. The school serves 10th through 12th-plus. The bulk are seniors. Students can attend until 21 years

ALC sees the biggest intake this time of year, and it will graduate up to 80 percent of students. Class of 2020: 56 percent graduated in four years, but 84 percent ultimately graduated. Connections continue and students are encouraged to continue.

Students have a meaningful connection with at least one adult. Expectations for students: embrace challenges; everything matters; consistency counts; leave your mark; and make the experience theirs. All have something that has challenged, and ALC wants them to find strength to move past and be supported.

STRIVE relationship started at North Campus — it's been 28 years. Some years it was books, some years partial scholarships. The program has had a big impact and helped students "see that their next step is possible," Gretchen said. She told stories of students who have gone on to find the college of their choice, like the recovery program at Augsburg University, StepUP. "This scholarship helped me see my worth," said Shelby, one of the STRIVE recipients. Another, Jennifer Fenton Herlick (Class of 1998), went on to get a degree in elementary education at College of St. Catherine. Earning the STRIVE scholarship got her to Century and she then went to St. Kate's, becoming the first member of her family to graduate from a four-year college.

Ken Baltzer, who has led our club committee that interviews the students, said he is continually inspired by the young people and the staff.
